can people. Dr. Steibel stated that that was exactly what they were doing that night.

Another had its beginnings last Veteran's Day when a member of the student body had suggested the burning of the American Flag before Mrs. Bethlan, wife of Dr. Bethlan, Economics professor at the college. Mrs. Bethlan apparently approved of the Teach-In

itself but questioned the motives of the Leftist movement. "How far is this going to go?" she cried, referring to the Veteran's Day incident. "What kind of people are those who belong to this movement, that they would suggest the burning of the American flag?" The student who committed the act was in attendance and publicly admitted his action, claiming that he was not serious and "had meant

no harm." This brought cries of disapproval from the majority of students and townspeople in attendance, though no disturbance or verbal accusations were made.

The discussion of the issue at hand continued for another hour without incident, centering around the future of South Vietnam where the Americans are asked to heed the cries of the student left and "get out."

Dr. Link then turned over the meeting to President Angell, in attendance throughout, who praised the group for its willingness to listen and to discuss, remaining in good conduct. He said that he hoped the discussions would serve to throw new light on the issue for those who were there and hoped discussion would not stop because the teach-in was over.
